Cougar Watch: May 2013

"Big cat" sightings are increasing around the state again this spring and all April sightings reported to Ohio Mountain Lion Watch are from nearby communities: Warren County, Liberty Township, Clinton County, Indian Hill, Sharon Woods, Bridgetown Road (Neumann Golf Course area), Chillicothe, and north of Lebanon. If the trend in sightings follows those of past years, reports in Ohio will occur throughout summer and autumn, tapering off without completely disappearing during the winter. Certainly numerous sightings throughout the region go unreported. The awe, surprise, and disbelief that this particular native mammal inspires make many wonder if they really saw one. Typically, the viewer sees a big cat briefly from a distance and can't believe they just saw an actual mountain lion. Others aren't sure what they saw but their description is of this likely candidate. Viewing time (or preparedness) to take a photo or video is usually short so seldom happens. Meanwhile, the mountain lion continues to do what it does best - stay out of view and trouble with people in the Midwest while it goes about life.

The April edition of Cincinnati magazine includes the story "Unsolved Mysteries". One highlighted is big cat sightings around Cincinnati - including Price Hill - and the work of OMLW to help keep track of them. Although not considered "official" by state wildlife officials, four Enright sightings in recent years (2 in spring/2 in autumn) make our location one of the more concentrated areas of sightings. In an attempt to determine if there may be a year-round resident adult, a trail cam was placed (January 20 - March 17) at the edge of the woods at one of the two sighting locations. Out of forty-nine photos, none were of cougar - no proof either way. However, the 5-point buck that comes around managed a nice portrait as did a coyote and some local fun-loving teens.

As we're out and about in the neighborhood, traveling, or on campouts, this is a good time to be aware of our surroundings without becoming overly concerned about encountering danger. Education for all ages about safety in nature goes a long way, whether it's avoiding wasp stings or something bigger. Big cats deliberately avoid us and are very good at it - the chance of even glimpsing one is incredibly slim. We enjoy a diversity of wild and domestic animals on the street and surrounding area; it just so happens that every now and then that might include *Puma concolor* (aka mountain lion or cougar).

Go to <http://cagismaps.hamilton-co.org/csarcincinnati/> On the right side is a menu. Click on "Building Problems". Then click on "Vacant Residential Building" and there you can note whatever problems you feel are there, especially the open door and windows. Emphasize that it has been empty for three years, with no maintenance of any kind.

You can also go down to "Trees, Bushes, Grass and Weeds" farther down the list and then click on "Tall grass/weeds on Private Property" The tall grass/weeds are evident from the street. You can walk down the driveway and see that it is just as bad if not worse in the back. You can fill in this information on the form.

If each of us does this just a few times I think we will get some results.

Energy Blitz in Price Hill

The Enright Eco-Village and the EGG committee are partnering with Price Hill Will, Imago, Santa Maria and the Community Councils of East, West and Lower Price Hill to participate in the energy blitz of Green Umbrella.

The goal of the challenge is to recruit owners and renters to sign up for an energy audit. This is a whole -house audit that will identify specific ways to reduce energy usage in your residence and alert you of the grants and subsidies that are available to make needed changes. Some of these changes could be more insulation, weather stripping and new windows.

The energy blitz partnership will offer presentations in each of the three neighborhoods featuring People Working Cooperatively and the Cincinnati Energy Alliance and their particular programs. Residents who have already had the audits and made changes will be available to share their specific experiences of cost, amount of money saved, and the improved comfort in their homes.

ERUEV residents who have completed the audits and changes are: Jennifer Belisle, Deborah Jordan and Bill Cahalan, Jim and Eileen Schenk, Suellyn Schupe, and Frank and Tracy Rottenberger.

Presentation will be given at the Elder Shaffer Center on May 15, Santa Maria Financial Center on May 21st, and St. Michael’s Bingo Hall on May 23. They all begin at 6:30.
